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New Direction in Ministry

The ordination to the diaconate of Mario Núñez in November marked an era of new possibility in the Diocese of El Salvador.

Núñez has long served as lay minister in the Church of San Pedro y San Pablo, and heads an active team of lay evangelists and ministers working in the area.

The ordination extends the active diocesan evangelists program begun two years ago. Local lay leaders receive encouragement and support to move into new levels of ministry. Of 12 trained evangelists, four have moved into the advanced theological programme. (CAETS)

Mario's mother, Mercedes, took a lead role as lay member to educate the children of the community and found the Church in this refugee hamlet about 30 years ago.

Visual Health Project

Clinics continue on a monthly basis to provide eye examinations and inexpensive glasses. Isabel Claros has graduated from high school and is prepared to start the training in January at the National University to oversee the project in San Martín.

Women's sewing co-operative

At this time the number of women does not meet the legal requirements to form a co-operative; however, with one machine and some training it is possible for some individual women to develop micro-businesses. The continuation of this project will be in the hands of the future incumbent of the parish.

Children's and Youth

Programme continued with the traditional Summer Bible School that takes place each year during December. Members of the youth group, helped by Evangelist Flor de María, put on a great programme for 25 children. The program finished with a grand drama Monday, 21 December.

Farewell Event at Playa del Oro

Cuilapa is located about 2 kilometres from a lovely stretch of beach. The people in the parish, being locals, have access to an almost unoccupied open beach near the Church.

As a farewell party members of the parish hired a large truck and went down to the beach to play fútbol, bathe in the warm Pacific waters and share a picnic.

This little celebration gave Ed and Kay a chance to say goodbye in a fine setting while the young people were enjoying themselves.
